Audio Described Events

This means there will be someone describing any pictures or what's happening in a show to help any people in the audience who have little or no sight.



British Sign Language

This means there will be somebody using sign language to help any people in the audience who are deaf or hard-of-hearing to know what people are saying.



Captioned Events

This means that there will be words on a screen to help people who are deaf, or hard-of-hearing know what is being said, or to describe any sounds.

Rage is something many disabled artists and people in our community feel.

After talking with artists, DaDa heard loud and clear that, while some progress has been made, too many decisions are still made without involving disabled people.

This has left disabled artists and disabled communities raging that the gaps in society are getting wider and that life for disabled people is still not equal or fair.


